Seasonal reminders

- Dry feed supplements for stock will assist in maintaining weights even on poor residual feed reserves.
- Protect fruit crops and vineyards from bird damage with a Laser Bird control system. Laser systems allow re-entry with machinery for additional fungicide and weed spray applications.

Viticulture

Disease management in vineyards has been a focus over the last month subsequent to late December and early January rain events. Powdery Mildew infections are still kicking around in a number of vineyards. Late season Botrytis could also be a problem in some vineyards especially where the disease has been present in previous seasons. If Botrytis protection efforts were a little lacklustre around flowering time it would be prudent to keep an eye out in those disease prone spots now. The FJs agro's can assist in disease identification if another set of eyes is required in your vineyard! A large amount of **Rust Mite** activity is evident throughout the region. The darkening or /bronzing of the vines leaves is a good indicator of mite activity. This effect becomes more prominent after warm weather, especially over the last couple weeks when we have actually had some hotter daytime temperatures.

Rust Mite are best controlled at woolly bud stage, just prior to budburst. Higher rates of sulphur applied at that time of the season will knock down mite populations without impacting foliage or the grape crop. **Grapevine Scale is also becoming more and more of an issue** in local vineyards. Increased ant activity in the canopy will be a good indicator of the Scale populations.

Scale are sap sucking insects that may also spread viruses between vines. They also produce honeydew, which can become a growth medium for Sooty Mould late in the season. Sooty Mould can negatively impact grape quality. It is therefore important to manage scale to minimisecont page 2/

from page 1.... these "down the line problems" over the course of the season.

Although Scale is very evident in vineyards at this time of the season, they are best treated during dormancy and very early after budburst. Growers should note where scale is taking place now with a view to sorting them out late in winter and early spring.

Some vineyards have had **Surround** applied over the last couple weeks prior to the hot days toward the end of January. The white tell-tale residual covering on the foliage of these vineyards is very visible. Surround does a great job in summer heat management in many horticulture crops including wine grapes, reducing heat stress and sunburn. Surround is an inert kaolin clay that once applied to the canopy, simply acts as a sunscreen. Surround can reduce the temperature within the vine canopy by as much as 8°C. This significant difference reduces the vines moisture requirement, improves fruit quality and leaf retention leading up to harvest

Bird control is an important consideration especially in those vineyards located on the perimeter of regional production areas and in those outlying vineyards encompassed by natural bird habitation and woodlands. Gas guns and other scaring devices are somewhat effective but need to be moved about and also backed up with some physical effort, ie shooting. Netting is more effective but can be problematic if any additional entry for fungicide and herbicide applications are required.

Vintage is well underway in the Riverland and just beginning in the Barossa region. Ensure you are prepared by checking stocks and the condition of bins, buckets and tools. We have bin paint and thinners, new Mega bins, Nally buckets and snips all in stock.

Once fruit has been picked, **post-harvest care** including nutrition applications and ongoing irrigation is important for the vine's recovery. Vines will undergo a root flush immediately after harvest in an effort to replace the nutrient reserves lost via the current crop in readiness for dormancy. It is therefore important to ensure a supply of key nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorus

are available to the vine during this flush. Highlighting the importance of this post harvest boost is the evidence of nutrient deficiencies in many vineyards late this season. Please discuss an appropriate post-harvest nutrition program with them.

Improved soil structure, moisture retention and associated water holding capacity as well as weed suppression are all benefits achieved from under vine mulch applications. Citrus and Orchard

As has been the case over the last few weeks, **Red Scale and Mealybug populations require ongoing monitoring** and treatment if populations determine. Trivor, Movento and Applaud will all do the job on these damaging pests.

Final applications of **nutrition will assist in fruit sizing and also to manage heat stress**. Products such as Low-Bi urea, Pot Nitrate, ZM2 Stoller, Mega Kel-P or TechMap are all useful in this space and determined by SAP and soil tests.

Surround will also provide sun protection to trees over the remainder of summer. Our notes in the viti section above are also application to tree crops.

Post Harvest nutrition should be applied as soon as possible after harvesting **stone fruit**. Tree roots will also actively seek to replace nutrition reserves lost through the fruit removed over harvest. This sap movement will be active prior to leaf fall and the onset of dormancy and will have a significant influence on next seasons fruit crop.

Broadacre

Fertiliser orders should be finalised to ensure timely supply of all planting fertiliser. Global conflicts have affected shipping availability and routes which has in turn caused a knock-on effect into fertiliser transport. Current quotes indicate fertiliser arrival times into Australian ports may already challenge our ideal sowing dates. Our recommendation is to place orders now to avoid additional delays. Urea is very topical at the moment as global prices have lifted over recent weeks, catching importers by surprise. Despite the common view that urea may soften later in the season, we believe that these higher prices are likely to settle at the current rates in the lead up to sowing. There is limited urea volumes available at the moment with the main supply starting to arrive early in April.

The urea market is always quite volatile and so may correct downwards by top dress. We will continue to monitor this market and make recommendations on the information we have from all importers.

Summer weed control has been on the go over the last few weeks with the majority of broadacre croppers now completed a round of summer knock downs. Some paddocks have also had a second application following more recent rainfall. Continue to monitor paddocks where Silver Leaf Nightshade is present. Even though there has been a very good initial knockdown, another germination is evident in some paddocks. Starane is the best product to reduce these populations when applied December through to February.

Recent hot and dry conditions have stressed most untreated weeds. Herbicide rates will need to be increased to ensure adequate control is achieved under these adverse conditions. Similarly, weed size for some paddocks that haven't been sprayed needs to be considered with regards to our rates, this is especially the case for weeds such a melons, wireweed, and even volunteer cereals that are starting to come out in head. We have seen a good germination of wild radish for some which has proven an excellent opportunity for an early knockdown to help drive down seed banks.

Soil samples and root disease testing should also be completed over the next couple months. Results from soil tests may influence fertiliser decisions, making these a bit of a priority.

Other soil ameliorants such as lime and gypsum should be ordered as soon as possible to avoid delivery delays and provide time for spreading over the coming weeks. **Penlime** is available within allocations at the moment but is only in limited supply. Please call us urgently if you require this product specifically. Suitable alternative options are available in better volumes.

The FJs agronomy team can provide helpful information on each source to determine the most appropriate option for your situation.

Gypsum is available. However, collection ex Blanchetown is a little clunky, requiring an appointment to arrange pickup and confirm that a loader is available on site. We urge customers **not to leave collection too late or too close to seeding time** in the case that logistics do not allow them to outload gypsum in a timely manner. Last season's bad experiences don't need to be repeated!

We have an offer from IPF to assist growers interested in using bulk Easy N in the coming season. Easy N may be worth considering given the volatility in the urea market this season. IPF are offering up to \$1000 off the invoice price for the first 3 loads of Easy N dispatched to growers who install a **new tank on farm**. We can assist clients through the site registration and proof of purchase details required to receive the credit. Orders for the first load of Easy N need to be placed by the end of Feb 2024 while the remaining 2 loads need to be dispatched by the end of Sept 2024. This offer is also being supported by Polymaster who are offering a discount on applicable fertiliser storage tanks. This offer is limited and within a tight timeframe, please call any of the Farmer Johns staff for assistance.

Pasture

January has flown by; it won't be too long before the autumn pasture jobs will be on the agenda! Our agronomy team love pastures and collectively have a vast amount of experience that should be utilised for paddock-by-paddock variety and blend selection as well as nutrition and weed management. Pastures are an important tool in mixed farming and grazing enterprises and should be managed accordingly. With a little **more focussed effort, most producers could get more out of pastures** than they historically have. Annual grasses, mixed species and either dryland or irrigated paddocks all provide opportunities for grazing, hay or silage. All these situations will mean different management tools need to be employed to maximise production. The summer **rains have also been very beneficial to lucerne paddocks**, with some stands in the mallee looking just outstanding. Brassicas have also flourished after the December rain events, providing unexpected summer feed on those properties that have included them in their feed rotations. Some paddock preparation will typically need to take place prior to sowing pastures, please contact us to discuss what should be sorted before autumn.

Lice continue to cost the Australian sheep industry over \$70m annually. Losses occur from devalued fleeces as a result of matted wool, reduced fibre length and strength, discolouration and style as well as lost body condition due to the stress and discomfort of their presence. Lice live their entire lives on the body of the host sheep. Direct contact is generally required for lice to transfer from sheep to sheep. Anecdotally, all lice infestations begin on "the neighbours farm"! Shearing will significantly reduce the size of the lice population by their physical removal and subsequent exposure to the elements. Backline treatments applied immediately after shearing will have the most impact on the remaining populations.

Elanco Australia have a range of products suitable to include in a robust lice management program, including a special offer on Extinosad and L Viper. Rotation of active ingredients should also take place to ensure chemical resistance doesn't occur on the farm.

Please call any of our stores for additional advice on sheep lice management. Recent media publications have alerted all sheep producers that eID tags for sheep and goats are on the way and will be mandatory by January 1st 2025. The SA Government has announced funding to incentivise the early adoption of sheep eID tags for the 2024 season. The proposed eID Tag Payment Program will
